### Saving Our Precious Lands, Habitats, & Ecosystems

Forrest Waterhouse was born in the farmhouse on his family's property in 1920. He passed away 96 years later in the same home. The Waterhouse Farm operated for many years as a dairy and transitioned to a beef cattle operation in the 1970s. Your



donations helped RRCT secure an agricultural easement working closely with Maine Farmland Trust, fulfilling Forrest Waterhouse's desire—ensuring the property will always remain as a farm.

# The Trail Crew & You

### What is stewardship?

Stewardship is the on-going, long-term commitment of time and resources to the conservation of land, and its implementation is essential to RRCT's ability to protect land in the future.

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More than just a historical property, the 427-acre Waterhouse Farm is an iconic piece of Maine scenery. Located on North Pownal Rd. in New Gloucester, the farm lies between two of the Royal River Conservation Trust's primary focus areas for land conservation, Pisgah Hill in New Gloucester and Runaround Pond in Durham. Thanks to you, we're connecting more of our area's most precious unfragmented land blocks, retaining our area's scenic beauty and protecting its natural habitats.

Through your strong support this past year we were also able to purchase some of the last remaining Royal River shorefront in the town of Yarmouth and preserve a 70-acre parcel of land on the Intervale in New Gloucester. As the population of the Royal River watershed continues to grow, land continues to be developed. Without initiatives to save
